At the last election, I said we would strengthen Medicare, and we are delivering on that promise. We are strengthening our health care system, making sure Australians can access the care that they need when they need it most.

We have already saved Australians money through our cheaper medicines policy, and now we are taking the hassle out of filling your script and are making medicines even cheaper.

Patients will no longer be required to attend a pharmacy every month, and will now be able to fill a script for two months at a time.

That's fewer visits to the doctor each time you need a prescription, fewer visits to pharmacies, and fewer fees.

We've cut the cost of medicines, we're helping GPs to invest in their practices, and we're opening Australia's first Endometriosis and Pelvic Pain Clinics and Medicare Urgent Care Clinics across the country.

The Albanese Government is strengthening our health care system for all Australians.



Medicare Urgent Care Clinic for Cessnock



Planning for the Medicare Urgent Care Clinic in Cessnock is almost complete and a site has been chosen and will be established as part of an existing GP clinic in the area.

I recently met up with Health Minister, Mark Butler, and he confirmed that the new clinic will be open in the next few months.

The Urgent Care Clinic will make it easier for locals to get high quality care for urgent, but non-life threatening health issues. The Urgent Care Clinic will be open extended business hours, seven days a week to provide the care you and your family need, with no out of pocket costs to patients.

This new clinic will take pressure off of our local emergency department, leaving overworked doctors and nurses available to attend to more serious and life threatening cases.

GP Access After Hours Restored For Toronto

I am also pleased to announce that after reinstating funding for the GP Access After Hours Clinic at Toronto Polyclinic, hours have been restored.

We said we would save GP Access After Hours after the previous Government cut the funding, and we've wasted no time in getting on with the job.

I know how important the increased hours of operation for the clinic at Toronto Polyclinic is to Lake Macquarie families. This will mean patients are able to access face to face and telehealth primary care services outside business hours. These services are bulk billed and delivered by GPs and Registered Nurses.

All of this means residents in the Hunter electorate will have access to quality care and will mean a reduction in Hospital waiting times.



Cheaper Child Care

Around 6,500 families in the Hunter electorate are set to benefit from the Albanese Labor Government's Cheaper Child Care scheme, from the 1st of July.

The changes will cut costs by about \$1,700 a year for the average family on \$120,000 a year, who have a child in care three days a week.

96% of families in the system will be better off under Labor's changes, and no family will be worse off.

Cheaper Child Care will help ease cost-of-living pressures on families, and make it easier for parents to return to paid work, or work more paid hours, if they want to.





Cheaper Energy Bills In Hunter

I know the anxiety that many households face when receiving their quarterly power bills.

That's why I am pleased to share with you that residents and businesses in our community may be eligible to receive rebates off their electricity bills under the Albanese Government's Energy Price Relief Plan.

Households and businesses may be eligible for a rebate of up to \$500 off their power bills.

The scheme will be delivered in partnership with the NSW Government, and will come into effect from the 1st of July.

This is responsible and targeted cost of living relief, and I know it will make a meaningful difference to households and businesses in our community.

Much Needed Pay Rise For Aged Care Workers

After a decade of neglect, we're getting on with the job of fixing aged care. We have delivered a record \$11.3 billion dollars in funding for a 15% pay rise for aged care workers.

Every worker deserves a fair day's pay for a fair day's work and that's what this will deliver for thousands in aged care across the Hunter electorate.

This Budget commitment will deliver a pay increase for more than 250,000 aged care workers across the country.

Registered nurses, enrolled nurses, assistants in nursing, personal care workers, head chefs and cooks, recreational activities officers (lifestyle workers) and home care workers will see a historic increase to their award wages.

The wage rise will reflect the intent of the Royal Commission into Aged Care Quality and Safety's final report to improve pay for aged care staff.

Aged care workers look after our loved ones and it's time we look after them.





Farewell Old Girl

It's the end of an era for our region in the Hunter, with the closure of the Liddell Power Station. Liddell was built in 1971 and served our region and our state for well over 52 years. It provided much of New South Wales with reliable, affordable power and provided our region with well-paid, secure jobs.



We knew this day would eventually come. The closure was first announced in 2015, and, in the period since then, Liddell had two extensions to its life. But it is still a sad time for those in the Upper Hunter who have grown so used to seeing the smokestacks of Liddell just outside of Muswellbrook. It's part of the Upper Hunter, and it's hard to imagine what it will be like driving up along the New England Highway when we'll no longer be seeing it, in just over 18 months, when demolition has been completed.

Liddell had well and truly done its service to us, but the time had come for the aged power station to close. It had reached the end of its economic and physical life. As it aged, it became less reliable for our energy grid, more expensive to operate and more unsafe for those who worked there. This is why it was time for it to close.

Liddell was a baseload power station. Its job was to run 24 hours a day, seven days a week, making sure our state had reliable power when it was needed. But because of its age, we could not depend on Liddell to supply us with reliable

power like it once did. In recent years, the station was operating under capacity. This is why there is no need to fear about our energy supply or price hikes, now that it has closed. This has also been confirmed by the Australian Energy Market Operator, who has told us that there will be no threat to supply from the closure.

I'm proud that the Hunter has been a powerhouse for New South Wales for over half a century, and I will spend every day that I work in this job fighting to make sure that we continue to be the region that keeps the lights on in New South Wales for the next 50 years as well. While the closure of Liddell is the end of an era, it is also the start of a new one, filled with new opportunities and good, secure, high-paying jobs in our area.

Thank you to everyone who has worked at Liddell over the years. The Hunter and the whole of New South Wales is grateful for the important work that you did to keep us warm in the winter and cool in the summer.

Goodbye, old girl.

Congratulatory Messages

Did you know that Australians who are celebrating certain milestone birthdays or wedding anniversaries can request a congratulatory message from the Prime Minister, Governor-General or the King?

My Electorate Office can organise congratulatory messages for 50th, 60th, 65th and 70th Wedding Anniversaries and for 90th & 100th Birthdays from the Governor-General, Prime Minister, Premier, Federal and State MPs and Local Government representatives.

The King and Governor-General will also send special messages for 60th Wedding Anniversaries and 100th Birthdays.

You can request a congratulatory message through my electorate office. To request a message, you can call the office on 02 4991 1022, contact me via my website, www.DanRepacholiMP.com or visit the office at 3 Edward Street, Cessnock. Please note that you must provide evidence (eg. birth certificate, marriage certificate, statutory declaration).

The message will be posted directly to the nominee. For surprise messages, an alternate postal address (to a relative or care-giver for example) can be given for the message.

A congratulatory message can be requested up to two months prior to the event. A belated message request can be requested up to one month after the event.

WANT TO BECOME A JUSTICE OF THE PEACE?

By volunteering to become a JP, you will provide services to your community or place of employment.

To become a JP you will need to:

Step 1: Confirm your eligibility and register for JP Online.

Step 2: Complete the JP Knowledge Test on JP Online.

Step 3: Complete the JP appointment application on JP Online. This includes requesting a NSW Member of Parliament (MP) to consider nominating you.

Step 4: Take the Oaths of Office.
